This very strong 17th-century German hymn employs many phrases from the psalms, especially Psalms 150 and 103:1–6. It did not receive an effective English translation until the mid-19th century, but has remained popular ever since, thanks in part to its stirring tune.

After writing the first stanza of his "Christian Good-bye," the author sent it to two composers, one celebrated and one unknown, to see how each would set it. This is the second person's tune, which the author found more effective and used for the hymn's first publication.

We anticipate converting to a mortgage this year, but because of COVID-19 we are delayed in wrapping up final punch list items. Once we do convert to a mortgage annual payments are estimated to be \$216,000. Our monthly payment will move from \$10,000 per month (interest) to \$18,000 (principal and interest).
