


Hunger Task Force Formed

Please keep the Task Force in your prayers and look for information to come out in the next few months.

Mission for Maui

In response to the devastating wildfires in Maui, the Mission Committee would like to take up a special collection for Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) relief efforts on Maui. PDA is identifying local partners and assessing needs to determine how best to respond to immediate needs for shelter, healthcare, food, and counseling for survivors, among other things. Summary of the August 21, 2023 Session Meeting

The Session unanimously approved the installation of a freestanding church sign on the southwest corner of the Shaker Drive entrance to the parking lot. It will be identical to the sign by the Amherst Avenue entrance and will also be erected and paid for by the Property Committee at great savings to the church. The sign will be located on a wide easement between the driveway and the church's vacant lot.

In other business:

- Work on rectifying the ongoing humidity issue in the sanctuary will continue with testing to determine if the current air handling unit needs to be upgraded or if there are air leaks in the attic or a combination of those issues requires attention.
- The Finance Committee reported that budgeting for 2024 is getting underway.
- A group of church members interested in serving on the Hunger Task Force, a project prioritized by the
 congregation in the recent Visioning Project, plans to hold an organizational meeting within the next few
 weeks.
- Pastor Hoffman announced that he will be encouraging committees to restart some popular churchwide activities that were dropped when the pandemic began, as well as injecting new ideas to the mix, with the goal of bolstering everyone's sense of connection to the church and each other.

Window on Mission

In an effort to keep the congregation better informed about the its work, the Mission and Local Outreach Committee has decided to share periodic informational updates. In addition to increasing awareness about what it is doing in the community, nationally, and globally on the congregation's behalf, these communications will also encourage participation in hands-on mission opportunities. Here is a summary of activity from April to August.

<u>Local Mission</u>. On Saturday April 29th nine CMPC volunteers joined efforts under the auspices of **Rebuilding Together Howard County (RTHC)** to improve a property in Elkridge. They undertook a variety of indoor and outdoor projects involving carpentry, plumbing, electrical work, and landscaping. CMPC was a financial sponsor of RTHC again this year. On July 19th, members of CPMC also participated in a fundraising dinner for RTHC at Lib's Grill in Maple Lawn.

On the fourth Monday of every month, CMPC volunteers continue to provide and serve hot dinners at **Grassroots Route One Day Center** in Jessup for the homeless in our community. The number of persons using the Center continues to grow, as does the need for food. This is an ongoing mission that welcomes new volunteers. Suzy Crabb has agreed to be the new point person for this mission. (Susan.crabb@verizon.net)

On August 24, seven members of CMPC participated in a work day at **Home of Our Own Howard** that provides furniture and household items at no cost to individuals and families transitioning from homelessness to permanent housing in Howard County. There are ongoing opportunities for hands-on mission work for those interested in lending a hand. The committee made donations to support the **Howard County Food Bank** which is run by the Community Action Council of Howard County https://cac-hc.org/ and **Laurel Advocacy and Referral Services (LARS)** https://www.laureladvocacy.org/ The mission of both programs are consistent with the committee's focus on addressing homelessness in our community.

<u>National Mission</u>. The committee made a donation to support the mission of Dustin and Holly Garner at **OneEleven Ministries** in Kansas City where they are preparing interns to sing and pray the Bible and share God's goodness through evangelistic outreaches.

The committee also made a donation to support **Pine Springs Christian Summer Camp** in Pennsylvania where a growing number of children from our church attend each year.

In response to the devastating wild fires in Maui (Hawaii) on August 8th, the committee agreed to match contributions from the congregation which will be sent to the **Presbyterian Disaster Agency** to support relief efforts with local partners on the ground.

<u>Global Mission</u>. The committee also made a donation to support the work of the **Presbyterian Education Board (Pakistan)**. PEB runs 25 elementary and high schools for over 5,000 students. The schools were founded in the mid-1800s by Presbyterian missionaries and were the first to include girls.

Of course, this would not be possible without the generous support of our congregation for which we are very grateful and appreciative.


