Word in Music Every Valley by J. Martin

#### Scripture: Luke 1:26-45 (Common English Bible)

<sup>26</sup> When Elizabeth was six months pregnant, God sent the angel Gabriel to Nazareth, a city in Galilee, <sup>27</sup> to a virgin who was engaged to a man named Joseph, a descendant of David's house. The virgin's name was Mary. <sup>28</sup> When the angel came to her, he said, "Rejoice, favored one! The Lord is with you!" <sup>29</sup> She was confused by these words and wondered what kind of greeting this might be. <sup>30</sup> The angel said, "Don't be afraid, Mary. God is honoring you. <sup>31</sup> Look! You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you will name him Jesus. <sup>32</sup> He will be great and he will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give him the throne of David his father. <sup>33</sup> He will rule over Jacob's house forever, and there will be no end to his kingdom."

<sup>34</sup> Then Mary said to the angel, "How will this happen since I haven't had sexual relations with a man?"

<sup>35</sup> The angel replied, "The Holy Spirit will come over you and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. Therefore, the one who is to be born will be holy. He will be called God's Son. <sup>36</sup> Look, even in her old age, your relative Elizabeth has conceived a son. This woman who was labeled 'unable to conceive' is now six months pregnant. <sup>37</sup> Nothing is impossible for God."

<sup>38</sup> Then Mary said, "I am the Lord's servant. Let it be with me just as you have said." Then the angel left her.<sup>39</sup> Mary got up and hurried to a city in the Judean highlands. <sup>40</sup> She entered Zechariah's home and greeted Elizabeth. <sup>41</sup> When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leaped in her womb, and Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit. <sup>42</sup> With a loud voice she blurted out, "God has blessed you above all women, and he has blessed the child you carry. <sup>43</sup> Why do I have this honor, that the mother of my Lord should come to me? <sup>44</sup> As soon as I heard your greeting, the baby in my womb jumped for joy. <sup>45</sup> Happy is she who believed that the Lord would fulfill the promises he made to her."

CMPC is participating in the Cold Weather Shelter again this year: The dates are **December 30th through January 5th.** Grassroots is hosting the CWS at its recently renovated facility on Freetown Road. CMPC will be providing continental breakfasts and hot dinners for 70 guests. Many CMPC groups, members and one of the Boy Scout Troops have stepped up and all of the dinner slots are filled! Thanks to all those who've already volunteered their time and meals!

Dinners should be delivered to CMPC hot and ready by 4:15 PM on the sign-up date. If you (or your group) prefer to take them directly to Grassroots, please have them at the shelter by 4:45. Breakfast should be delivered to CMPC by 4:15 the day before it is to be served.

For breakfast, we are asking for 3 volunteers to provide breakfast for 24 people each. Each volunteer should provide fruit and either cereal/breakfast bars/muffins/doughnuts/bagels. Since they are fine with a variety, there is no need to coordinate with other volunteers. There are still many breakfast slots available: Please consider filling one or several!



We are also invited to provide up to three volunteers (minimum age 15) to help serve the dinner. Though an earlier deadline for signups has passed, you can still look at the sign-up genius link below and inquire about serving, since spots remain open. Volunteers will need to sign a confidentiality form and bring it with them. You can sign up to provide food through December.

With a paraphrase of Psalm 62:5 as a refrain, this Advent text adapts four of the "Great O" antiphons (all of which can be seen in no. 88), combining them with a paraphrase of Psalm 95:6–7 and an echo of a medieval hymn. This rich blend yields a wealth of imagery and meaning.




Here is a chance to sing a familiar French carol tune with new words, the most important clearly being "Love." The senses "seen and heard" (as in Acts 4:20 and elsewhere) organize the first two stanzas, while the third holds the summary statement: "Love is the gift of Christmas."

# O Lord, How Shall I Meet You



Though many Advent hymns address Christ with entreaty and invitation, this more contemplative text considers how an individual prepares for and responds to Christ's coming. It also brings together a recollection of the First Coming with an anticipation of the Second Coming.




This French carol probably dates from the 1700s, though it was not printed until the following century. Because it uses a vernacular language for the narrative stanzas and Latin for the refrain, it belongs to a special category called "macaronic" or mixed-language texts.
