TEXTS FOR THE WEEK

1 Samuel 16:1-13

The Lord said to Samuel, "How long are you going to grieve over Saul? I have rejected him as king over Israel. Fill your horn with oil and get going. I'm sending you to Jesse of Bethlehem because I have found my next king among his sons."

- ² "How can I do that?" Samuel asked. "When Saul hears of it he'll kill me!"
- "Take a heifer with you," the Lord replied, "and say, 'I have come to make a sacrifice to the Lord.' Invite Jesse to the sacrifice, and I will make clear to you what you should do. You will anoint for me the person I point out to you."
- ⁴ Samuel did what the Lord instructed. When he came to Bethlehem, the city elders came to meet him. They were shaking with fear. "Do you come in peace?" they asked.

- ¹⁰ Create a clean heart for me, God; put a new, faithful spirit deep inside me!

- ⁶ When they arrived, Samuel looked at Eliab and thought, That must be the Lord's anointed right in front.
- ⁷ But the Lord said to Samuel, "Have no regard for his appearance or stature, because I haven't selected him. God doesn't look at things like humans do. Humans see only what is visible to the eyes, but the Lord sees into the heart."
- ⁸ Next Jesse called for Abinadab, who presented himself to Samuel, but he said, "The Lord hasn't chosen this one either." ⁹ So Jesse presented Shammah, but Samuel said, "No, the Lord hasn't chosen this one."
- ¹⁰ Jesse presented seven of his sons to Samuel, but Samuel said to Jesse, "The Lord hasn't picked any of these." ¹¹ Then Samuel asked Jesse, "Is that all of your boys?"
- "There is still the youngest one," Jesse answered, "but he's out keeping the sheep."
- "Send for him," Samuel told Jesse, "because we can't proceed until he gets here."
- ¹² So Jesse sent and brought him in. He was reddish brown, had beautiful eyes, and was good-looking. The Lord said, "That's the one. Go anoint him." ¹³ So Samuel took the horn of oil and anointed him right there in front of his brothers. The Lord's spirit came over David from that point forward.

Then Samuel left and went to Ramah.

Anti-Racism Policy

In 2024, the General Assembly of the PC-USA included in their constitution--the Book of Order--a requirement that all councils, including the Session of each church--adopt and implement an antiracism policy. Many churches have already adopted such policies, and have experience and templates to offer. There is also assistance in forming the policy to be found through the Presbytery and its Anti-Racism team. Two elders and one deacon have already expressed interest in helping to form a proposed policy for Session's approval: If you have an interest in being part of this process and discussion--please let us know! Bob and Shelley Clemens

Bob and Shelley Clemens were introduced by a mutual friend in 1979 when Shelley was on her first assignment as a state trooper with the Maryland State Police and Bob had just taken a sales job in the software industry. They moved to Columbia in 1983 and were married six months later in October. The couple joined CMPC in December 1984.

Bob is Chair of the Pastor Nominating Committee that is conducting the search for our next installed pastor. Shelley is currently leading the Memorial Garden fundraising campaign. They have both served as a deacon and an elder in the past, and are currently serving together as deacons on the Fellowship Committee. Shelley joined the Trinity Choir in 1984 and sings alto.

Bob spent nearly 40 years in various sales leadership roles in the enterprise software space. After retiring from his corporate career in 2017, he founded an executive coaching business as a second act and it occupies his

time for 15 to 20 hours a week.



Shelley was one of 10 females on the job when she started her law enforcement career and has served as a hostage negotiator, recruiter, trainer and criminal investigator. She investigated everything from street crime, white collar crime, environmental crime, illegal drugs, asset forfeiture and money laundering before retiring in June 2005 after 26 years.

In 2006 she enrolled in floral design programs at the Community College of Baltimore and at Longwood Gardens, where she later taught classes. Ultimately, she found her home at the Flower Basket in Ellicott City and retired from that shop on Jan. 1, 2020.

Shelley still loves everything floral, including directing the greening of the church at Christmas, and also enjoys reading books of all genres and rooting for the Baltimore Ravens and Kansas City Chiefs.

Bob enjoys running, working out at the gym, pickleball, snow skiing, golf, tennis and working in the yard. He likes to say, "I have a hard time sitting still for long periods, so I am mostly in perpetual motion!" He roots for the Baltimore Ravens and Washington Commanders and hopes those teams may one day meet in the Super Bowl.

He has especially enjoyed working with high school youth in the 1980s before the start of LOGOS, going on Mars Hill mission trips to North Carolina, and attending Easter sunrise services and the church picnic every September.

One of Shelley's favorite memories involves CMPC's founding pastor, the late Rev. James Salango. She recalls with amusement how she and Bob visited the church one Sunday and signed a pew card, only to have Jimmy show up at their home for a visit the next day.

628 Praise, I Will Praise You, Lord

This simple song based on Psalm 9:1–2 was created in the mid-1970s for a morning devotional of a group touring in the picturesque high Alps. Later it was incorporated into their programs and soon spread throughout Europe and the world, being translated into many languages.



Originally written for the uniting of the Lutheran churches in Tanzania, this prayerful hymn touches on the need of the whole church at all times for the Holy Spirit's guidance and blessing. When appropriate, the refrain can effectively be used alone as a prayer response.



This spirited African American gospel hymn draws on John's vision of the new heaven and the new earth in Revelation 21:3–4, with its wonderful promise that God will wipe away the tears from all eyes, that death will be no longer, and that there will be no more mourning or pain.
