Texts for the Week

John 1:35-51

³⁵ The next day John was standing again with two of his disciples. ³⁶ When he saw Jesus walking along he said, "Look! The Lamb of God!" ³⁷ The two disciples heard what he said, and they followed Jesus.

³⁸ When Jesus turned and saw them following, he asked, "What are you looking for?"

They said, "Rabbi (which is translated *Teacher*), where are you staying?"

³⁹ He replied, "Come and see." So they went and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon.

⁴⁰ One of the two disciples who heard what John said and followed Jesus was Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter. ⁴¹ He first found his own brother Simon and said to him, "We have found the Messiah" (which is translated *Christ*). ⁴² He led him to Jesus.

Jesus looked at him and said, "You are Simon, son of John. You will be called Cephas" (which is translated *Peter*).

⁴³ The next day Jesus wanted to go into Galilee, and he found Philip. Jesus said to him, "Follow me." ⁴⁴ Philip was from Bethsaida, the hometown of Andrew and Peter.

⁴⁶ Nathanael responded, "Can anything from Nazareth be good?" Philip said, "Come and see."

⁴⁷ Jesus saw Nathanael coming toward him and said about him, "Here is a genuine Israelite in whom there is no deceit."

⁴⁸ Nathanael asked him, "How do you know me?"

Jesus answered, "Before Philip called you, I saw you under the fig tree."

⁴⁹ Nathanael replied, "Rabbi, you are God's Son. You are the king of Israel."

Congregational Meeting

The Session has called a congregational meeting on Sunday, January 25, 2026 immediately following worship. The meeting is to approve the budget and the pastor's Terms of Call. All members are encouraged to attend.

WINDOW ON MISSION

In an effort to keep the congregation better informed about the its work, the Mission and Local Outreach Committee shares periodic informational updates. In addition to increasing awareness about what it is doing in the community, nationally, and globally on the congregation's behalf, these communications also encourage participation in hands-on mission opportunities. Here is a summary of activity from July to December of 2025.

Local Mission

- On the fourth Monday of every month, CMPC volunteers provide and serve hot dinners at **Grassroots Route One Day Center** in Laurel for the homeless in our community. The number of persons using the Center continues to grow, as does the need for food. This is an ongoing mission that welcomes new volunteers. Suzy Crabb is the point person for this mission.
- The committee made donations to support **CMPC Preschool, Bridges to Housing Stability, Laurel Advocacy and Referral Services, Columbia Community Care** which operates food pantries in Howard County and the **Howard County Food Bank** which is run by the Community Action Council of Howard County. Even with the support of local and state nutritional programs, food banks, and other services, thousands of families still struggle to find consistent access to food and essential resources every week.
- In lieu of the Angel Tree, Sue Ashman and Rachel Bis facilitated a partnership with **Toys for Tots** that to collect toys in November. In December, hats, gloves, and socks were collected for the CWS. In addition, monetary donations from the congregation were received for gift cards for Grassroots residents. FISH separately did Christmas shopping, wrapping and donating gifts to seven students at local schools.
- For the twenty-second year, CMPC participated in the **Cold Weather Shelter** organized by Grassroots Crisis Intervention Center. From December 29 to January 4, CMPC volunteers and groups including LOGOS, Scout Troop 75, Women's Bible Study, and the Mission and Local Outreach Committee, provided and served home-cooked dinners and delivered breakfasts to 60 residents (including homeless persons) housed at the Grassroots facility in Columbia. Suzy Crabb, Tina Helble, and Kathryn Koch helped coordinate effort and transport the food.

National Mission

- M&LO supported two national missions; namely, the Fuller Center Disaster Rebuilders – Moss Point, MS house re-build and Pine Springs Christian Camp in Jennerstown, PA, which a number of young people from CMPC attended.

Global Mission

- The committee supported **Ahli Arab Hospital in Gaza**, the only Christian hospital in Gaza, which continued to treat victims of the war in Gaza throughout the fighting.
- The committee donated funds to support **Save the Children relief efforts in Ukraine**, which supplies hygiene kits, offers mental health and psychosocial support, the provides child-friendly spaces, and cash transfers to families affected by the war.
- It also helped **Friends for Health in Haiti**, which is striving to improve the health of the people in the community of Gatineau through an outpatient clinic that provides primary health care, and hygiene education, as well as livelihood assistance to those in need.
- The Fifth Sunday Offering on August 31 was accepted on behalf of the **Uganda Water Project** and on November 30 for **Grassroots and the cold weather shelter**.

Of course, this work would not be possible without the generous support of our congregation for which we are very grateful and appreciative.

Words of Charge and Welcome

The Sacrament of Baptism

The act of baptism is deceptively simple—but in a handful of water, there is a deep well of mystery and meaning. In baptism, we are called to a new way of life as Christ’s disciples, sharing the good news of the gospel with all the world. Presbyterians describe baptism as a sign and seal of the covenant of grace made by God through Jesus and extended to us: In baptism, God claims us as beloved children and members of Christ’s body, the church, washing us clean from sin as we renounce the power of evil and seek the will and way of God.

Infant baptism expresses that it is God who chooses us for faith, discipleship, and salvation; without God, we have no power to claim these things for ourselves. However, we affirm that people come to faith at different stages in life, and recognize the baptism of older believers as an equally valid expression of the sacrament. Presbyterians also allow for baptism by immersion. Whatever the method, the deep significance of baptism demands a visible and generous use of water, conveying the lavish outpouring of God’s grace, filling believers with the gifts of the Spirit, and overflowing in lives of faithfulness, service, and love.

A congregation’s session authorizes baptisms and provides for the spiritual growth and nurture of members. That’s why a ruling elder of the church always presents the candidate for baptism. In turn, both the family and the congregation promise to contribute to the baptized person’s Christian formation.

Christ’s gracious invitation is open to all, and the PC(USA) recognizes all baptisms with water in the name of the Father, of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit administered by other Christian churches.

But baptism is only the beginning of a lifelong process of formation in the faith.

So remember your baptism and be thankful! In the sacrament of baptism—our inclusion in the covenant of grace, incorporation into the life of Christ, and anointing with the gifts of the Spirit—we have countless reasons to give God thanks and praise. As Jesus said, “Out of the believer’s heart shall flow rivers of living water” (John 7:38). Filled with the never-failing grace of Jesus Christ poured out for us, our hearts overflow with gratitude and joy, spilling out into the world in lives of service and love for God and neighbor. As those who ourselves have been baptized in the name of the God who created us, Jesus who redeemed us, and the Spirit who sustains us, we join together in welcoming, by her baptism, Amara Bhatti into the life and ministry of the Risen Christ.






